We really are heading towards the Christmas break now, and as more and more of our families put up their Christmas trees we are heading into a final two weeks of festivities and celebrations:



• Tuesday 12th December: over 50 of our students from across the academy will be

working with the community fundraising team at Barnes Hill Asda to collect items to donate to St Basil's. If you're planning on doing your shopping on that date be sure to drop in, say hello and donate items to charity whilst you're at it!

- Wednesday 13th December: Academy Christmas Lunch will be on sale each lunchtime. There will be no breaktime service in the Dining Room on this date so that our catering team can prepare for Christmas Lunch. Roast dinner with all the trimmings will be available and I would thoroughly recommend that you make sure that your son/ daughter is able to have the annual Christmas lunch
- Wednesday 13th December: 30 lucky students will be rewarded with a trip to see 101 Dalmatians at the Birmingham Rep. This is their Christmas production and we have been able to secure tickets to be shared with those students who have worked hard and contributed to the academy this term

- Tuesday 19th and Wednesday 20th December: College reward assemblies to celebrate student achievements will take place throughout the day

On Thursday 30th November 2017 the academy was lucky enough to play host to two performances devised by the REP and 2nd year Applied Performance students from Royal Birmingham Conservatoire (formerly Birmingham School of Acting) as part of a community tour.

One of the performances entitled 'A Brief History of Brilliant Women' was aimed specifically for Years 7 & 8. Eighty-six pupils were selected to attend the event as a reward for demonstrating excellent effort, creativity and focus in their Drama lessons this term.

The piece followed the character of Jess, a top-notch runner who isn't allowed to join the school's running club as she is not a boy. Jess is then forced to enlist the help of Cleopatra, Joan of Arc, Amelia Earhart and a chorus of brilliant women from History to help her follow her dreams and succeed. The performance was followed by a question and answer session which enabled our pupils to understand the challenges of putting on a devised performance.

The other performance targeted our year 9, 10 & 11 students who have chosen to study the subject as an option. The classic text of 'Great Expectations' was chosen to be told through a modern lens. It was a contemporary exploration of gender, violence, class and poverty staged as an increasingly strange Victorian Christmas party.

It was a really positive afternoon with the audience thoroughly enjoying the performance. The students and lecturers from Birmingham Conservatoire also commented on how fantastic all pupils were as audience members and how they would like to come and work with the academy again in the future.

Venus College Immersion Day

Last Wednesday saw the first of three immersion days of the academic year, which focus on a variety of different topic areas linked to Citizenship Education. With this being the first experience the year 7 students would have had related to an immersion day there was clearly a large amount of excitement leading up to the day. The 7 students were involved in a variety of exciting and engaging sessions related to <u>'Healthy Living'</u>. Sessions focused on the importance of road safety which were crucial sessions for students to understand and demonstrate responsibility when out and about by busy roads, and remaining safe during the dark nights which we are currently experiencing.

The second session focused on the importance on staying safe online and using social media. Students were able to discuss the risks which they can face related to using the internet and how these can be overcome. Students provided an array of insightful ideas and demonstrated key tips to staying safe and how they can protect personal information.

The fourth session focused on issues related to bullying and the effects bullying can have on individuals. Students learnt about the support and guidance which we can offer if they ever experience or are subject to any form of bullying whether it physical or verbal. This proved to be a really engaging session where students were able to discuss a variety of scenarios and provide advice which they would offer to the students affected.

Finally our year 7 students participated in a practical based session which focused on the importance of remaining fit and active through adolescence. During this session they learnt about the different components of fitness and incorporated these when performing a variety of fitness based challenges, demonstrating excellent resilience and determination, completing each challenge to the best of their abilities.

The day was a huge success and one which the students got so much from, it was fantastic to see how well they engaged with each session. A monumental effort from the Venus College team, who planned, prepared and delivered outstanding and inspiring session related to our chosen theme.

Jupiter College Immersion Day

Year 8s participated in the first Immersion day this week held by Jupiter college. The theme was Healthy Lifestyle, Minds, Work and Leisure and the students participated in a number of different work-shops, with a combination of practical and interactive sessions. These included:

- Enterprise A 'Dragon's Den' style exercise pitching a new product to promote a healthy lifestyle. Students were able to use their persuasive skills within a group activity to try and win the pitch.
 - Active Teamwork students were placed in teams to work together, using their individual abilities to catch the other 4 teams in a relay style activity, followed by a competitive bench ball tournament.
 - Media Advert Designing and producing an advertisement for promoting a healthy lifestyle. Students here used their creative and technical skills to create an eye catching advert.
 - Mapping Exploring the local community and mapping leisure centres, parks and other landmarks that people would use for a healthy lifestyle. Combined with attitudes and behaviour around the community, Birmingham and Britain as a whole.
 - First Aid/CPR led by Mr Willshaw and Mr Horgan this gave students the opportunity to learn and experience practically, the skills required to save someone's life. The students enjoyed this session hugely!
 - Myriad Oxford University attended our first Immersion Day and led a session with the groups, conducting Healthy Mind/Mindfulness questionnaires, leaving the students reflective following this session.

A fantastic Immersion Day and thank you to all of the staff involved who created, led and volunteered to be part of the sessions.

Neptune College Immersion Day

Year 11 had another successful immersion day with a range of activities. Our pupils took part in a group challenge where they had to form a government, leading changes to policy and influencing others. Saturn College Immersion Day

The theme of year nine's first immersion day was Health and Well-Being. Students looked at a range of issues, including online safety, knife crime, drugs and healthy eating.

In the healthy eating session, groups researched key information about a balanced diet in order to make good decisions about their dietary intake. This information was used to create a healthy meal plan, which students could take away with them and use.

This year we incorporated Child Exploitation and Online Protection Centre (CEOP) training into the day. The year group learnt the dangers of sharing too much information online and over text message and where they could go to for help and support. The dangers of drug abuse were also debated with students, who researched the consequences of a range of drugs.

Students also completed a session that looked at the risks of gang culture, knife crime and peer pressure. For students to make informed decisions about all of these areas, a crucial factor is an individual's feelings of self-confidence and self-worth. Therefore, students also completed a session where they were able to value their achievements, have them recognised by others and then recognise success in others.

Well done to year nine for their behaviour and positive approach to all of the sessions, which included working in new groups and with new pupils. Finally, I must add a big thank you to all the staff that supported them during the day and completed so much work for them behind the scenes.

Mercury College Immersion Day

Mercury College had the pleasure to plan and prepare an Immersion Day for our Year 10 students based on the theme 'Aspirations'. Prosecution of parents/carers, Education Act 1996 Section 444

We are required to publish the results of the cases heard at Birmingham Magistrates Court on 1st December 2017.

Shenley parents receive £851 fine for non-attendance of their child.

Prosecution of parents/carers, Education Act 1996 Section 444

At Victoria Law Court on the 1 December 2017, after hearing the circumstances of the case the Magistrates imposed a fine of £660, costs of £125 and a victim surcharge of £66; a total of **£851**. This fine was issued due to persistent unauthorised absence from school.

Persistant absence from education leads to a £730 fine for family of Shenley Academy student.

Prosecution of parents/carers, Education Act 1996 Section 444

At Victoria Law Court on the 1 December 2017, after hearing the circumstances of the case the Magistrates imposed a fine of £550, costs of £125 and a victim surcharge of £55; a total of **£730. This fine was issued due to the repeated failure of the student to attend school without valid reason.**

<u>£140</u> fine issued to parent of Shenley Academy student who repeatedly failed to attend school.

Prosecution of parents/carers, Education Act 1996 Section 444

At Victoria Law Court on the 1 December 2017, after hearing the circumstances of the case the Magistrates imposed a fine of £60, costs of £50 and a victim surcharge of £30; a total of **£140. The financial penalty was issued due to persistent absence from school.**

Education matters and unnecessary time off school will affect students' progress and attainment. We expect parents of all of our students to ensure that they attend regularly and on time unless there are genuine reasons for their absence. We may ask for medical evidence if we have concerns about regular absence.

Calling all Shenley Academy parents/carers! Are you interested in becoming more involved in the life of our academy? Then becoming an Academy Ambassador could be the role for you!

Q. What are Academy Ambassadors?

A. Academy Ambassadors are volunteers who give some of their time to the academy to work with staff and students to continue to improve our academy for all.

Q. What sort of work does it involve?


- A. Academy Ambassadors have **4** key roles in the academy:
 - **Celebration:** to help to make sure that celebration of staff, students and parents remains a priority for each academy, and to find the best way to do this.
 - **Communication:** to work with staff, students and parents to make sure that the academy effectively communicates to all stakeholders, so that everyone feels part of academy life and has the opportunity to access information and events.
 - **Concerns or complaints:** to act as an independent local point of contact for staff, students and parents to express their concerns. Academy Ambassadors will signpost people to the right channels for dealing with their issues and will ensure that any concerns or complaints are fed back to the AAG. Where any trends emerge, the Academy Ambassadors work with the Principal and other ambassadors to help find solutions. Academy Ambassadors will also always form the majority of members on any appeals panels.
 - Community: making sure that the students maximise on local opportunities by finding ways to keep the academy at the heart of the community and acting as a key link between the two. To really help the academy to explore what it can do to make the school a hub of community services.

Q. How much time do you need to give to the role?

A. There are 5 after school meetings this academic year, including an afternoon in June. All meetings take place on Wednesday afternoons from 5pm to 7pm. In addition you will receive invitations to the half termly raising attainment board (RAB) meetings which take place in the academy with members of the E-ACT Head Office team. You will also need to have some training so that we support you to carry out the role as effectively as possible. You don't need to attend every RAB meeting, but you should try and be available for at least one meeting each academic year as part of the role of ambassador.

Q. I'm interested! How do I find out more about the role?

A. Speak to reception staff and ask for Mrs Maguire – the PA to the Principal and she will arrange for you to meet with Mrs Monk and Mr Banton (the Chair of the Ambassador group) to discuss the role in more detail.
